Report on March 17 Annual General Conference:

Seminar A: Psychology in the Court: In context of Mandated Child Protection Agencies

Central to this seminar was a discussion of psychologists as providers of parental capacity documents to the Court of Queens' Bench. Guests from Winnipeg Child & Family Services and Legal Aid, described the services they request of psychologists, some of the issues of contention in contracting these assessment services, and the expectations they have as consumers of psychological assessment services. It was their hope to expand the current roster of service providers. The general message was that the work of psychologists was valued, trusted, and in short supply. Psychologists involved will discussed the process of these assessments, what is unique to these assessments, how assessments must be useful to the court, and the nature of court testimony. Those attending were very positive in their feedback regarding this workshop.

This seminar focused on psychological assessment for court purposes where the opinion required is to establish risk of harm, violence, or re-offending. Psychologists Dr. Rothman and Dr. Kolton outlined their approach to these issues, and generated considerable discussion from an involved audience.

The Communications Community Award for 2010

An Introduction to CPA's Practice Directorate

How Did It Start?

The Council of Professional Associations of Psychology (CPAP) meets biannually to discuss issues and to take collective action. Its members are the provincial and territorial psychology associations and CPA. Prior to 2007, CPAP also included the psychology licensing colleges, who now belong to the Association of Canadian Psychology Regulatory Organizations (ACPRO).

Following the June, 2008 CPAP meeting, representatives of CPAP and CPA met to find ways to work more closely together with more money to better advocate for professional psychology. These discussions resulted in a proposal that CPA launch a Practice Directorate with a directing council drawn from the provincial, territorial and national associations, the members of CPAP.

This proposal was approved in principle by CPA in November, 2008 and by CPAP in January, 2009. In February, 2009 the Board of Directors of CPA voted to direct a portion of its 2008 year-end surplus to launch the Directorate. Further, the CPA Board agreed to increase membership dues to finance both a Practice Directorate and a Science Directorate. CPAP contributes about 40% of the Directorate's annual budget.

Mandate

The mandate of the Practice Directorate is to support and advance professional psychology through collective advocacy. It is based upon the shared commitment to meet the advocacy needs of the practice of psychology across Canada's fourteen jurisdictions. Trust, good faith and a collective commitment to the common good of psychology are keys to success.

Action

The Directorate is undertaking a number of activities. A strategic planning exercise isolated several key issues:

The need for a common branding of professional psychology across Canada.

The common branding will lead to a common lexicon of terms and definitions so every Canadian government hears the same messages in the same language from all provinces, territories and CPA.

A focus on primary care (mental health and behavioural health) to leverage the interests of

Canadian governments in this area.

The Directorate has been busy over the past 15 months. It has undertaken the following: A strategic planning process with an initial goals setting session and report.

Engaged a communications and government relations consulting firm (Delta Media in Ottawa) to facilitate ongoing strategic planning and collective decision making and to produce a report.

Commissioned a survey of key stakeholders (government, media, and associations) to determine their views of psychological services and produced a report.

Planning a national survey of Canadians to determine their views of psychological services. There will be an option for provincial/territorial specific additional data if associations want to contribute financially.

Developing a Network of Psychologists in Primary Care (NPPC) to identify psychologists working in primary care and their roles and responsibilities.

Developing policy statements specific to the practice of psychology:

The CPA Practice Directorate asserts that all Canadians regardless of income have the right to access psychological services when needed.

The CPA Practice Directorate asserts that all Canadians have the right to work in a psychologically healthy workplace.

The CPA Practice Directorate supports the development of Doctor of Psychology (PsyD) education and training programs in Canada.

The CPA Practice Directorate takes actions to support the development of practice standards in co-operation with CPA and CPA sections.

The CPA Practice Directorate takes actions to support the development of practicum, internship/residency and post doctoral fellowship placements for psychology students, interns/residents and post-doctoral fellows in Canada.

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President's Report

Manitoba Psychological Society Annual General Meeting 2011

Your representatives on the board of the Manitoba Psychological Society (MPS) have been working hard at advocating for our discipline in various capacities. I encourage you to read the reports prepared by the board members to learn about the initiatives taken on by MPS throughout the past year.

One of our biggest opportunities to network with psychologists from across Canada was at the Canadian Psychological Association (CPA) Convention, which was held in Winnipeg in June, 2010. Manitobans had a particular advantage because we also met with Dr. Jon Gerrard (Manitoba Liberal leader) and Mr. Rob Altemeyer (Legislative Assistant to the Minister of Housing and Community Development and the Minister of Conservation) who volunteered their time at an Advocacy Workshop aimed at teaching participants about connecting with government to discuss relevant psychological issues. MPS has and continues to follow up with politicians and government officials.

Another valuable opportunity for national advocacy efforts occurs during two yearly meetings with the Practice Directorate of CPA. As you know, this group (chaired by our own Dr. Jennifer Frain) includes representatives from each province and territory as well as representation from CPA. Not only do these meetings allow us to discuss advocacy strategies across provinces, but, as a collective group, we began working with a marketing firm to develop a national campaign to promote psychology. The overall message of the campaign is to "promote the practice of psychology in Canada as well as to use the knowledge and expertise of the science and practice of psychology to contribute to the development of health and social policy in Canada." More specifically, the campaign will highlight: (i) "the qualifications of psychologists and their proven efficacy as providers of psychological intervention"; (ii) "the return on investment from access to psychological services"; and (iii) "the positive impact (of psychology) on the primary care system in Canada and, in particular, access to family physicians".

We have already taken preliminary steps to achieve these goals. Given that one of the health initiatives mentioned in the Speech from the Throne focused on Primary Care, we have had numerous meetings with the Executive Director of Health Systems Innovations and Primary Health Care and the Executive Director of Mental Health and Spiritual Health. Our goal is to be sure that Psychology is 'at the table' when Manitoba Health is addressing Primary Care initiatives.

In addition to learning about psychology in Canada, a number of board members attended the State Leadership Conference in Washington, DC this past week. Dr. Leonard Greenwood (Executive Director), Dr. Jennifer Frain (Chair of the Council of Professional Associations of Psychologists), Dr. Rehman Abdulrehman (Diversity Representative), and I represented Manitoba at this conference to network with our friends to the south. Although the 'hot topic' of the conference was related to the implementation of parity and comprehensive healthcare reform, it was interesting to hear about initiatives taken on by the American advocacy groups to increase their political power. There were also scheduled sessions with the Canadian delegates and a meeting with Dr. Katherine Nordal, the Executive Director of APA's Practice Directorate. We voiced our concerns regarding the potential elimination of the reduction of APA fees for individuals who are already members of CPA. This issue will be followed up by one of the Canadian delegates.

I would like to extend my sincerest appreciation for the tireless efforts of the MPS Board. Dr. Julie Beaulac (Director-at-Large) and Ms. Lauren Yallop (Student Director) organized excellent events for psychology month. Psychology Month has certainly been a wonderful way to educate the public about a broad range of topics that are covered by psychologists. Thank you to all the presenters. We hope that many more members will be interested in participating next year. Dr. Carrie Lionberg (Director of Communications) assisted with the promotion of Psychology Month to the media and she continues to be a resourceful contact to media who are looking to interview a psychologist. In order to connect with local organizations and businesses, Dr. Matthew Bailly is busy working with a committee to promote the Psychologically Healthy Workplace Award. Dr. Rehman Abdulrehman, the Director of the Disaster Response Network, has been evaluating this portfolio to determine how it could best serve Manitobans at a local level and how to coordinate MPS members who are interested in providing psychological services at an international level. As previously mentioned, he was also nominated and received full funding from APA as a Diversity Representative at the State Leadership Conference.

The MPS website continues to be updated by Dr. Doug Tataryn (Registrar) and GAT Technology with new features coming soon. We hope that you continue to enjoy the sporadic emails announcing job advertisements, continuing education opportunities, and other relevant information for psychologists. 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Proposed changes to Constitution Manitoba Psychological Society, Inc.

At the annual general meeting, March 17 6pm Clarion Hotel, the following changes to our Constitution will be put to membership vote. The changes essentially redefine the role of Executive Director by removing the ED from the board and Executive Committee. MPS will then be free to hire or contract for an Executive Director. Those items to be removed are 'struckout' and those added are in bold print.

Article VI, 6 (b)

A minimum of three Directors from the **five** six-member Executive Committee, including either the President or President-Elect or Past President shall constitute a quorum within that body when it meets. In the event of an equality of votes within the Executive Committee, the matter at hand will be tabled until a meeting of the Board of Directors can be held.

Article VII, (11)

 The Board may designate a Board Member as Executive Director, with duties variously assigned, without remuneration, and with membership on the Executive Committee.

Article VIII, 2 (a)

a) The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, President-Elect or Past President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, and Registrar and Executive Director.

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2011 AGM – TREASURER'S REPORT 17 March 2011

I wish to begin this report by acknowledging and thanking Len Greenwood for his considerable assistance with the Treasurer business while I was on maternity leave.

Attached to this report you will find our Proposed Budget for 2011. At tonight's meeting, you will also see a copy of the financial statements for the Manitoba Psychological Society for the financial year ending December 31, 2010, provided by Larry Cousins of the accounting firm of Duhard and Cousins.

I would like to make the following comments about our 2009 Financial Statement:

- Our overall financial situation continues to be a healthy one. Although a planned deficit of \$3,982.00 was budgeted, in reality, MPS registered a surplus of \$2,516.37, representing overall, a balanced budget.
- The overall net worth of MPS remains strong. Assets less-liabilities were at \$73,214.44 on December 31, 2010; a small increase over the past twelve months.

I would like to draw your attention to the following points about the 2011 Proposed Budget:

- As per a notice sent out to membership on February 24, 2011, we are requesting a constitutional change to redefine the role of Executive Director by removing the ED from the board and Executive Committee. Should this pass, we intend to recruit for a 0.2 EFT ED to begin in June 2011 at the earliest. This represents a new budget line of \$8000 in anticipated expenditures for the 2011 year. This will also entail an increase in that budget line to a total of \$16,000 for the following year.
- The increased budget expenditures for the ED position will be accounted for in part, by a previously scheduled increase in Membership revenue for the 2011 year, as well as by modest decreases across a number of budget lines.
- This year we continue to budget for three fee-for-service contracts: Administrative Service Contract (Interiors by Heidi), Web Management (GAT Technologies), and Web Design.
- We have budgeted a deficit of 388.00, which represents less than 1% of our untapped assets if fully realized.

General Website and Related Developments

Our MPS Psychology Referral Directory has been up and running for several years now and I continue to see it showing up on more and more psychology-related websites, which is pretty awesome. GAT Technologies and I are looking for a way to actually collate and summarize all those links so we can track the growing network of links over time. Adding the ability to find a psychologist via community region is still on the agenda, but has had to take a back seat to more pressing logistical and functional website developments (some of which have been described here).

Our webmaster (GAT Technologies) and I have also been working to reduce the paper work and processing demands of the Registrar's position, so the position will be easier to manage when I leave the position. For example, at certain times of the year I con-

stantly get emails from our McFarland-Rowlands asking if "so and so" is a member, usually for new members not on the official MPS list submitted to them earlier, but also for members who have been delinquent in their payment/ renewal processes. Official representatives of McFarland-Rowlands have now been supplied a link which provides an updated list of MPS members with a simple mouse click. This saves them and the registrar lots of time and emails and ensures our members with timely processing of their insurance applications. Another large time saver has been the creation of an automated summary email, sent to the registrar, for each new MPS membership application. No more combing through the many pages of an application and manually extracting the critical information necessary to take it forward for acceptance at the monthly board meetings. We are also in the midst of several other important process changes, such as making the electronic application process a little more user friendly, and requiring payment up front, prior to taking the application forward to the board.

GAT Technologies and the Website committee have continued our work on the "all-inone" (public, members, referral) website and a beta version is up and running, though not yet
publically assessable. We need to do some final tweaking on the looks and some checks and
balances on the contents. Watch your local email inbox for its official public debut. The new
site is based on Silverlight, Microsoft's newest and latest software for website development and
offers some very slick and dynamic design and layout options. For those of our members at institutions that don't have the latest software and can't easily upgrade their machines, we'll be
maintaining an optional re-direct to the old website, at least for a year or so. Since both websites (the old and the new) are updated via changing the documents and images in a common
directory structure, updating the new website will automatically update the old website!

As always, I and the board look forward to any feedback you might have about MPS and how we might make it even more effective and relevant to our members and the public, so if you have any suggestions or insights you would like to share with us, I strongly encourage you to do so.

I look forward to seeing you, not only at our AGM and conference, but Member's night and other psychology events throughout the year.

We have enjoyed robust relationships with the media which have helped us strengthen the public's awareness of the breadth of what psychologists do and the many ways that psychology can improve the lives of all Manitobans. These relationships are reciprocal in that members of media actively seek our input regarding ongoing news events or topics of public interest. In turn, our ability to contribute to their efforts enables us to educate the public about important concerns such as mental health issues, living healthier lifestyles or enhancing relationship functioning from the perspective of psychology. One of the more important additions to the communications work that MPS has been doing over this past year is the recognition of outstanding media attention to serious matters affecting society and people's well-being. We are pleased that the 2011 AGM marks the inauguration of the MPS 'Communications Community Award', which will be given to a media personality, agency, or business that makes a positive contribution to the community based on psychological principles. The first recipients of this award, CBC Information Radio, are being congratulated for their outstanding journalistic exploration of a carpentry skills training initiative aimed to help former gang members integrate into the work force and healthy community activity. As well, MPS has been pleased to participate in City-TV's Breakfast Television "Real Life Relationships" on a weekly basis regarding issues such as single parenting, work place stress, bullying, body image, and sleep issues. Unfortunately, the Breakfast Television format has recently undergone significant programming changes and our involvement has become comparatively less active, although the producers remain interested in our contributions to future feature programming. Finally, MPS members are strong participants in other media channels (e.g., Winnipeg Free Press, CBC-Radio, CJOB, Regina Radio-News, etc.) covering topics such as finance and happiness, psychologically healthy workplace, or the trend of delaying the decision to have children.

We have been pleased with the promotion of Psychology Month, coordinated by Dr. Julie Beaulac and Ms. Lauren Yallop, via poster production, announcements of events on the MPS website, an appearance on Breakfast Television, and radio coverage. We have also enjoyed ongoing promotion of psychology through fillers running throughout the year in the Winnipeg Free Press with messages such as "Psychology works for stress". Finally, we purchased air time on City-TV during Psychology Month and our commercial also aired numerous times during the Country Music Awards, which reaches a large number of viewers.

We remain grateful to all members of MPS that made themselves available to speak with the media and promote Psychology in Manitoba. We would be pleased to discuss this with those of you who might like to contribute to our Communications activities as we work to increase the awareness of Psychology in the media and to the public.

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Annual report for MPS Society Page

I started my volunteer position as editor of the MPS Society Page last year. Thank you to Matthew Bailey for his work on the page over the previous two years, and for his generous assistance in helping me transition into this new role.

At the onset of my term, the Board decided that changes should be made to how the MPS advertising was done. Namely, we decided against advertising in the Society Page, as it typically required a long wait before the ads could reach the intended audience. Instead, all advertising is now done by 1) posting the ads on our website for one month, and 2) sending a direct email notification to the MPS members. We feel that this is a more effective way to communicate advertising information. We also decided to increase the advertising fee to \$150.

I am happy to report that a total advertising income after implementing the above changes has increased substantially to a total of \$2,505 for 2010.

We continue distributing the Society Page electronically three times a year (January, May, and October), and continue receiving positive feedback from users.

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Disaster Response Network Annual Report

It has been a (relatively) quiet year for the Disaster Response Network in Manitoba. "Thankfully", only because there have been little to no disaster's to respond to over the past fiscal year in our province.

The DRN was contacted for potential support to resident's of St. Joseph, Manitoba, to help residents and support staff cope with the tragic death of a man in a snow-mobile accident in January, 2011. In the end, the residents sought assistance through a private company which offered individual counseling and therapy for those struggling with the event.

With the potential coming flood, the DRN remains readily in contact with news and media agencies to give interviews and provide tips to the public on what to do to cope with stress in the event of a flood. This is similar to what the DRN has done in the past instance of potential floods and flu pandemics.

Lastly, the DRN chapter of MPS in Manitoba was consulted by the University of Florida to determine strategies of dealing with psychological intervention for trauma survivors of the earthquake in Haiti.

Positive psychology is a recent branch of psychology whose purpose was summed up in 1998 by Martin Seligman and Mihaly Csikszentmihalyi: "We believe that a psychology of positive human functioning will arise that achieves a scientific understanding and effective interventions to build thriving in individuals, families, and communities."[1] Positive psychologists seek "to find and nurture genius and talent", and "to make normal life more fulfilling",[2] not simply to treat mental illness. The field is intended to complement, not to replace traditional psychology.
